The book is well worth reading, thought provoking. However, I found it to be over-analytical in some of the chapters, as it focused around the time of the resurrection. There are points which are brought to the reader's attention, which perhaps would not have otherwise been thought of by the reader. For example, the young man who fled when Jesus was arrested in the garden, could quite possibly be the same young man which the women saw when they looked into the open tomb to see him sitting there, absorbing that indeed Jesus had risen as He had foretold. Both parties were startled, and in the case of the women, afraid, given the time of the day. However, people are still to this day reading and re-reading the resurrection story as just that, a story, when if they took the time to read the story of the resurrection more slowly, and in its entirety, and not just the familiar parts of the story, they may start to see that in fact the story is historically based, as the people involved in the story were alive in the period that the resurrection story is based, as shown by the book, and on that basis it surely has the ring of truth, no matter what some people may think. There is no getting away from the truth of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ, once the reader has read and absorbed all the facts in the whole of the book.
